Children's Activity Book Extends Bicentennial

The Bicentennial of Columbus moved into the 201st year of celebration by helping promote Preservation Month in Columbus City Schools.


A specially-designed classroom activity book for third-graders has already made a "soft" debut with 60 students from Clinton Elementary School who pronounced it "excellent," and a formal debut of the activity book is planned for Avondale Elementary in May. Avondale's 1891 building, recently remodeled and updated, is featured.

Approximately 200 students from Fairmoor Elementary and resource teacher, Jacqueline Galbreath, will use their booklets during speciallyplanned walking tours (Urban Safari and Public Art, Treasuring the Works of Town-Franklin Neighborhood, and Underfoot: Looking at Green Lawn Cemetery) this month. The walking tours, pictured here at Kappa Kappa Gamma Headquarters on Town St.,

were created by Jacqueline Galbreath, a Gifted and Talented resource teacher who works with Fairmoor students and teachers. Clinton and Fairmoor Elementary students both have been studying the Seven Wonders of Columbus for the past year.

The Columbus Neighborhood Design Center, Columbus Landmarks Foundation, the City's Historic Resources Department, and the Social Studies Department of the Columbus City Schools teamed up in 2012 to create a children's activity booklet designed with young urban planners and budding preservationists and historians in mind. Graduate students, working on their own time and under the guidance of Al Berthold, Director of the Design Center, created pages that show selected iconic downtown and familiar neighborhood landmarks. Questions to provoke historic inquiry and observational skills were added by Columbus Landmarks Trustee, Doreen Uhas Sauer, who also worked with Clinton and Fairmoor Elementary schools. Director Al Berthold secured outside funding for printing and enough copies for all Columbus City's thirdgraders were gifted to the Columbus Board of Education.

Columbus Landmarks Awarded Back-to-Back Grants

Columbus Landmarks Foundation has been awarded two grants so far this year from different sources for the purpose of documenting our city's rich African American heritage.

The African American Landmarks Preservation Initiative was recently awarded a major grant from the Ohio Humanities Council. The OHC grant provides the necessary match for the initial grant from the Richard and Julia Moe Fund of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. This project was one of only six awardees of that fund in the country.

We have successfully recruited five of the six Research Team Leaders required to complete the work and are ready to begin the research. Prior research of Doreen Uhas Sauer, Reita Smith and others identified at least 12 African American settlements that will be included in this project: Peter's Run/Brewery District; Badlands; Flytown; West 11th Ave. near Olentangy (OSU area); Blackberry Patch/Poindexter Village/Bronzeville/Mt. Vernon/E. Long St.; Burnside Heights; Hilltop;, American Addition; Hanford Village; Teakwood Heights; Franklinton; and North 3rd.

The African American Landmark Preservation Initiative will establish African American Landmarks Preservation under the Columbus Landmarks Foundation organization. The goal of this initiative is to collaborate with existing and new preservation organizations and individuals, researchers, archivists, and others to research the identified African American settlements that existed and still exist throughout all geographic quadrants in Columbus.

The preliminary project is funded for one year with work commencing on May 1, 2013 and ending May 1, 2014 and will culminate in a 50page book to be available to the public. Columbus Landmarks was also **Government Grant** from the Ohio Historic Preservation Office for the purpose of preparing a National Register of Historic Places historic district nomination for Hanford

Incorporated as the Village of Hanford in 1909 and developed in 1946 and marketed to African American veterans, Hanford Village is a cohesive neighborhood of Cape Cod style homes. The development provided the opportunity to buy newly-constructed, quality housing for middle class families.

In the mid-1960s, Interstate 70 cut through the heart of the community, yet what remains of Hanford Village today is a thriving and close-knit neighborhood. The original boundaries ran between Main Street and Livingston Avenue; Lilley Avenue and Alum Creek.

In 2011, a Columbus Landmarks' AmeriCorps member documented 150 Mid-Century Modern buildings, over half of which were located in Hanford Village. Cathy Nelson and Rory Krupp are working to complete the nomination.

As some people with long memories may recall, I was the Executive Director of Columbus Landmarks from 1983 to 1988. Those were very good years, and I will always remember with pride the good things we accomplished. For the past twenty-five years, I have been spending most of my time teaching, writing and presenting the history of our country in general and Columbus and central Ohio in particular.

Until now.

When I left Columbus Landmarks, I told the Board that if my help was ever needed I would be happy to provide it. In February of this year, Kathy Mast Kane stepped down as Executive Director with the thanks and gratitude of the organization for her service. At the time of her departure, I was asked to come back as the Interim Executive Director. The search for a new Executive Director is underway and will be completed later this year.

After working for Columbus Landmarks once again for the past few months, I can say with some confidence that a lot has changed. In the 1980s we operated out of small offices in downtown Columbus. We had no computers, no Internet and every telephone we used had a cord of some kind attached. We accepted credit cards but few people used them so we made frequent trips to the bank. Our publications were expensive to produce because we had to pay for layout and design, as well as printing.





Two New Columbus Landmarks Titles

We are anxiously awaiting the release of two new Columbus Landmarks books at the end of May. Columbus and the Great Flood of 1913 by Conrade Hinds tells the harrowing story of Ohio's greatest natural disaster:

Beginning on Easter Sunday, March 23, 1913, Columbus and the Ohio Valley endured a downpour that would produce the largest flood in one hundred years. Heavy rains came on the heels of an especially cold winter, resulting in a torrent of runoff over saturated and frozen ground. Rivers and streams quickly overflowed and levees failed, sending tsunami-like floodwater into unsuspecting communities and claiming four hundred lives. There were ninety-six deaths in Columbus alone when the swollen Scioto River emptied water that ran nine to seventeen feet deep through the streets of the near west side. Join CLF Trustee, architect, and engineer Conrade C. Hinds and the Columbus Landmarks Foundation in a closer look at a flood disaster that reshaped the American Midwest.

Columbus grew from a one-horse town to a metropolis one day at a time. Tom Betti and Doreen Uhas Sauer of the Columbus Landmarks Foundation have selected the 365 most fascinating city history vignettes for each day of the year. Match your seasons up to the full range of Columbus history, from the marching band hired to test the strength of incomplete statehouse stairs in January 1857 to the prohibition of public dancing in city parks in December 1913, and enjoy delightful tidbits every day in between.
